
Joseph Priestley 1733-1804

English clergyman and Scientist




Priestley was famous for discovering 10 new gases: Oxygen, Nitrogen, Hydrogen, Sulphur Dioxide, Ammonia, Nitric Oxide, Nitrogen Dioxide, Hydrogen Chloride, Nitrous Oxide (laughing gas), Silicone Tetrafluoride Priestley spent many years living in Calne and actually discovered Oxygen gas at Bowood House.

Priestly was chosen because he was kind, inspirational, clever, resilient and happy.

Isambard Kingdom Brunel 1806-1859

Civil and Mechanical Engineer



Brunel is famous for building the Clifton Suspension Bridge in Bristol.

He was appointed Chief Engineer for the Great Western Railway (GWR) and designed and built Box Tunnel.

He had an office in Chippenham and built the viaduct close to the railway station.

Brunel was chosen because he was brave, confident and intelligent; he was also a great leader and communicator.

Major Banks was born in Chippenham.


He was a Royal Marine and was a Member of The Order of the British Empire.
